Subject: AKC Companion Events Scholarship Program

The Companion Events Department is pleased to announce the creation of a \$10,000 scholarship fund for students that are active in AKC Companion Events who will be attending an institution of higher education during the 2020-2021 academic year.

Definition of Companion Events:

Companion Events is defined as: agility trials, obedience trials, rally trials, and tracking tests.

Definition of a Higher Education Institution:

Vocational school, two-year junior college program, four-year college program, or advanced studies beyond a four-year degree.

Eligibility Requirements:

- 1. Applicants must be active in AKC Companion Events.
- 2. Applicants must be attending or planning to attend an institution of higher education during the 2020-2021 academic year.
- 3. Applicants must be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident.

The Criteria for Awarding AKC Companion Events Scholarships Include:

- 1. Applicant's degree of involvement in AKC Companion Events. Examples handler, club member, assistance in hosting events, community involvement in promoting Companion Events.
- 2. Applicant's higher education goals.
- 3. Applicant's financial need.
- 4. Applicant's GPA.
- 5. Extracurricular activities school or community related.

How to Apply for an AKC Companion Events Scholarship:

- Complete the Application form which can be found online at https://www.akc.org/sports/juniors/junior-handlers-in-companion-sports/.
- 2. Submit a 250–500-word essay explaining how involvement in Companion Events has impacted your life.
- 3. Submit an official GPA transcript from current school.
- 4. Documentation signed by a club officer confirming any volunteer work performed for the club(s).
- 5. Deadline: All information must be received no later than March 6, 2020.

A common concern across the sports is who will carry on these Companion Events that we love and are so important to demonstrate the dog's willingness to work with its handler by behaving in the home, in public places and in the presence of other dogs as a companion to man. The *Companion Events Scholarship Program* is meant to assist those young people that have demonstrated their interest in these sports to achieve their higher education goals and encourage them to remain engaged or return to the sports when their lifestyle permits.

A little assistance at a critical time can have a lasting impact. The following are letters AKC recently received from past scholarship recipients:

Cadet Steven Reiss - Steve participates primarily in Obedience and Rally trials. He was a Junior Scholarship recipient in 2018. His love for the sports and dogs taught him to work hard towards a life goal. He is attending SUNY Maritime College and expects to graduate in 2022.

"It is my honor to have been acknowledged by the American Kennel Club in receiving an AKC Junior scholarship to help me pursue my dream of becoming a Harbor pilot. I have been training and competing in Companion Events since the age of eight.
